Stairway of Stars

INTRODUCTION

Every county and every state have influential people who have impacted their own communities as well as wider society. Nodaway County is no different, which is why for this lesson, students will visit the Nodaway County Historical Society and Museum. There, students will learn about the local "stars" that were born and/or raised in the Nodaway County area. After their visit, students will have a better understanding of prominent people from their area and have the opportunity to broaden their knowledge about influential Missourians in a follow up project.

Essential Questions:

- 1. Why is it important to learn about influential people of history?
- 2. How did the influential people of Nodaway County leave an impact?
- 3. Why is it important to use museum etiquette and apply it to other aspects of life?
- 4. How did famous Missourians provide significant contributions to the world?

GOALS

- Identify prominent people of Nodaway County.
- Explain how the influential people of Nodaway County left an impact.
- Apply museum etiquette to other aspects of life.
- Identify and describe the significance of individuals from Missouri.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Before you and your students come to the museum, there are some things that you should go over. First, your students need to learn how to use museum etiquette. Here is a fun video that will help explain what you should and should not do in a museum. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=AozRXET2ssyM

After your students have been able to watch the video and learn about how to act while in a museum, you should have them practice! Allow your students to work in groups and pretend to be in a museum. Are they being respectful to the people around them? Are they touching the artifacts?

As you continue to get closer to your museum visit, explain to your students why it is important to learn about influential people, especially from Missouri.

You may also want to provide some background information on the museum that you will be visiting. You can go to the Nodaway County Historical Society and Museum's website and take a virtual tour of the museum. This will help the students realize what they will actually get to experience and get excited about the visit! Their website is http://www.nodawayhistorical.net/. You will also want to explain to your students about the Stairway of Stars. Here is the following information:

Stairway of Stars

"In this day and age of constant mobility and frequent migration, the places where people were born and their "hometown" roots are often forgotten and overlooked. The display that you are about to discover is a tribute to the lives of people who were born or raised in



Nodaway County and whose lives, abilities, actions, and work changed the course of American history. Most of them were not superstars, nor magnates. They were conventional citizens, who lived simply, but whose actions, achievements, and service to others reached people nationally. History will perpetuate their memory in its books and museums. This display contains pictures, artifacts, and posters that try to represent, in a small way, the great

contribution of these people. Every year the Nodaway County Historical Society adds a new member to the display. The achievements displayed demonstrate how far reaching the lives of these Nodaway County citizens were. It may surprise some, and bring pride to others, but it is meant to educate all. Enjoy taking a visual stroll through Nodaway County's remarkable citizens."

ACTIVITIES BEFORE VISITING THE MUSEUM:

Museum Etiquette

- 1. As a class watch the video,

- 2. Allow the students to practice what they have just learned. You may put them in groups to roleplay how they should and/or should not act in a museum.


Virtual Tour

- 1. Go to http://www.nodawayhistorical.net/ and take a virtual tour of the museum with your students!
- 2. Allow them to browse through the museum online.
- 3. Have them write down the areas of the museum that they visited virtually, in their Social Studies notebook.
- 4. Then have the students put a star next to the places that they would like to visit and learn more about!

ACTIVITIES AT THE MUSEUM.

<u>Star Search</u> Students will use clues to search the Stairway of Stars for the Nodaway County Star Search! Once they have found the star, they will read a little more about that person and write his/her name on the sheet provided. (See the end of this document.)

- 1. The students will be provided with a facts sheet about Nodaway County Stars.
- 2. Once they read a clue, they will search the Stairway of Stars for the star matching their clue.
- 3. Once found, the student will read about the star, then record their name on the blank next to their description.
- 4. If they want to know more about the star and the topic, and the star has a "star tag" (pictured below), the students will write down the area they need to visit to find out more!



<u>Star Struck</u>— If a Stairway of Stars star has a star sticker, the students will be able to travel to another section of the museum to learn more about the topic.

1. The students will pick a person (with a star sticker) that they are interested in learning more about.

- 2. The students then visit another area of the museum that elaborates on something their star has done.
- 3. While in that area, students are instructed to complete the activity provided in that area.
- 4. They will jot down their ideas, thoughts and observations in their Social Studies notebook.

ASSESSMENT/FOLLOW-UP ACTIVITY:

Quick Write. After the students get back to the school, they will use their notes to do a quick write about what they learned from the museum. This should include at least 5 names of influential people in Nodaway County and a brief description on how they made an impact on society. Students should also include a sentence or two about museum etiquette and how they applied what they learned in the video they watched before coming to the museum.

Prompt Questions:

- 1. What did you learn from the museum?
- 2. Who are 5 influential people of Nodaway County, and how did each of them make an impact on society?
- 3. How did you use the museum etiquette video to know how to behave in the museum?

Famous Missourians Project. Students will do a research project on a famous Missourian they chose from a list provided without repeating each other's choices. They will then present that information however they'd like during a

family social studies night. Details of the project may be found in the attached documents. (See detailed prompt and rubric at the end of this document.)
